

Psychological and Guidance Services

Psychological and Guidance Services

From exploring career possibilities and navigating subject choices to seeking support for wellbeing and safety, this year has shown how our learners are taking ownership of their growth and stepping boldly towards the future.

Career Guidance

Our matric learners had the exciting opportunity to attend the Working Worlds Expo at the Feather Market Centre, where they explored over 48 exhibiting institutions, organisations, and public services.

Another highlight for our school was the Grade 10–12 Career Evening – a dynamic and interactive event where professionals from a wide range of fields, from medicine and engineering to the trades, engaged directly with learners in an open dialogue format. These conversations offered invaluable real-world insights and allowed learners to envisage their own career paths in a more tangible way.

In addition to external exhibitions,

our school also hosted over 20 tertiary institutions and training organisations on campus this year. These sessions provided learners with firsthand access to information about programmes, qualifications, and scholarships.

Subject Choice

Making subject choices can be a daunting process. To support our learners, we enhanced our digital career guidance resources with online assessments and a comprehensive guidance booklet, encouraging learners to consider their academic performance, assessment results, and personal preferences together in a balanced and thoughtful way.

Counselling and Wellbeing

At the start of the year, I introduced myself to the learners with the reminder that “therapy is too good to just be kept for the sick.” The message was simple – anyone, at any stage, can benefit from therapy and self-reflection. It has been inspiring to see how many learners embraced this message, seeking support and engaging in the process of personal

growth.

As the school psychologist, I have been deeply moved by the courage and determination of our learners – their willingness to face challenges head-on, place trust in others, and believe in their own capacity for a brighter tomorrow.

This same courage and care extends to school safety. Our partnership with Humewood SAPS introduced a process for learners and staff to report incidents safely and privately on school grounds, ensuring that everyone feels supported and heard.

With curiosity, courage, and support guiding the way, our learners are not just moving forward – they are truly being prepared for life.

truly unmatched.



Saturday night saw each group arranging their own gatherings, and if rumours are to be believed, it was a night where "whatever happens in Vegas, stays in Vegas!"


Friendships were renewed, laughter shared, and memories created, leaving everyone feeling "Proudly Victorian."

News from Old Scholars



TRIBUTE TO ROBERT "PEPE" PRETORIUS (09/7/1939 - 24/03/2025) (Member of Staff 1962 - 1974)

Mr Bob Pretorius started at Victoria Park High School in January 1962 as a Secondary Assistant. In 1962, he introduced and organised the Matric Farewell Dance, a function which has become an annual one. He then left to take up a position at Dale College for two years and, unable to resist the lure of VPHS, he returned in October 1966.

He was instrumental in the formation of our first Interact Club and took great pleasure in organising

the first Variety Show, which became an annual event for many years. He devoted many hours to ensuring that the computerisation of reports was perfected and was an active member of the PTA.

Mr Pretorius started schoolboy hockey in 1962 and the school soon realised that he was a man of many talents! It was not an uncommon sight to see him perched on a tractor trimming the sports fields before school. He organised and accompanied the hockey team on their first tours to East London and Cape Town respectively. Affectionately known as "Pepe" for his jovial manner and endearment, he was

loved and respected by both pupils and staff.

It would be impossible to mention all the numerous activities in which he took an active part. From cricket coaching to fund-raising, no task was too big for him to conquer.

In January 1975, Mr Pretorius was appointed in the position of Vice Principal of Bergvliet High School in Cape Town and VPHS bid a sad farewell to him in December 1974.

Mr Pretorius will always be fondly remembered as a valuable and enthusiastic member of the VPHS family.

English Alive

The Earth Dies, the Poor Suffer, and the Rich Thrive

Maybe when the last tree is cut, the last fish is caught, and our rivers have been poisoned; we will realize that we cannot eat money. Our planet is dying – a slow, suffocating, and gruelling death. She cries out to us, but we collect her tears to fill our swimming pools. Her screams are muffled by the raucous sound of your Porsche. We drained her of colour so you could have high-definition television.

Our money multiplies while wages stagnate. We consume and destroy until our flesh rots and our bones grow brittle. Our mother can survive without us; in fact, she will flourish. do the job better. We kiss the hand that feeds us, only to break her fingers when our food seems bitter.

We are all children of our mother. We are all equal, but some are more equal than others. We worship struggle as if it makes us holy, setting everything on fire just to prove we can survive the smoke. We inhale deeply, shaming those who choke, convincing them that suffering is strength. Perhaps, one day, they will learn to live with the smoke. We watch as they writhe on their knees, begging for mercy—words falling on deaf ears. Because in the end, if your pleas are not aesthetically pleasing, if your pain is not trending, nobody listens. We glorify suffering not because we understand it, but because we have the privilege of watching it from a distance. Survival is only valuable when it is beautiful enough to be shared.

We feel sad for a moment, telling ourselves the world is cruel. Then we will move on—because it is easier than caring. Be-

cause caring demands sacrifice, and sacrifice is for the poor. We do not touch their hands because they are unpolished and dirty. Complaints are not tolerated; they should be grateful and build themselves another table. They are just lazy.

We protest and pray, none of us will die for our mother and her children. So we continue to whip them, leaving scars on their backs, then have the audacity to call them ugly. We watch them build heaven on our dying Earth, promising them that one day, if they are good enough, they will experience it too. We assure our mother that she will rest—that when our buildings are tall enough and our cars are fast enough, she will rest, and we will fix everything. All the pain we have caused her will be worth it, because then we will have evolved. And she will be proud of how far we have come, even if it was at her expense.

Gallery Outings

The GFI Gallery in Park Drive provided many inspirational exhibitions for our gallery outings:

“Creative Block” showcased a collection of colourful artworks by more than 250 artists, offering a rich and unique expression of South African culture.

Maureen Quin’s exhibition of bronze sculptures displayed eloquent voids and visually striking, harmonious volumes, encouraging pupils to ponder over her works. At the age of 91, Maureen Quin continues to be a passionate and inspiring artist.

The Standard Bank Corporate Art Exhibition, which travels to top gal-

leries across South Africa, offered insight and commentary on the physical, social, and cultural landscapes of African societies. Following this gallery visit, pupils enjoyed the visual feast of plants in the beautifully renovated St George’s Park Pearson Conservatory, originally built in 1882.

“Seeds are Sewn as Time Unravels” presented a collaboration with floral arrangements by the E.C. Floral Association. The exhibition used the metaphor of seeds to explore themes of time, memory, and transformation, reflecting growth, change, and the interconnectedness of past, present, and future. Artists employed contemplative techniques such as stitching and weaving to investigate personal truths and the experience of time.

Spring School of Art Workshop

The annual Spring School of Art workshop at the GFI Gallery is open



- The major project of the year involved creating clay vessels. Pupils explored the tactile qualities of this ceramic craft, later painting their

vessels with underglazes after they were bisque fired.

These club sessions were ably led by a Grade 12 committee, including Erin Bartlett, Philippa de Vos, Kendra Webster, Sibulele Mayedwa, and Gaia-Teria Govender. 



German School Exchange

Twelve learners were chosen to take part in the 5th bi-annual German African Partnership Programme (GAPP), an exchange that encourages stepping out of comfort zones, making new friends, and, for many, travelling abroad for the first time. 
As Mr Geldenhuys reflects:
